Joy of Giving: the Way of Life

Dear Friends,

Opinion about temples and priests are not so positive now-a-days. We have a feeling money works everywhere, if you need to jump queues in big temples, if you need to stand before the GOD for a longer period of time, if you need to book special prayers without notice - whatever you want except devotion can be purchased. When GOD himself wants to relinquish all material belongings and stand in front of you posing as "Palani Andi" (the beggar of Palani) - just with a piece of loin cloth we go and offer golden loin cloth! Temples have become a place where people can show their money power. The temple priests attract lot of criticism like they give preference only to people who drop currency notes into their plate, people who are willing to offer money for every bit of their service etc.

Last week we had ear piercing function for ten underprivileged girls. To perform the rituals we had invited Arun Sastry, a priest from local temple. This local Shiva temple is a very small village temple, but with more than six hundred years of history. The temple does not attract a large crowd on normal days. Only on some festival days, there will be a noticeable attendance in the temple. Arun Sastry will keep the temple open from 5 AM to 12 noon and again from 4 PM to 9 PM, but hardly there



will be any visitor on a daily basis. Such priests in village temples will hardly get any income. They have to do the job just for the love of it. Only on festival days, there is a possibility of some income to the temple and the priest. The priest is also married and has a family to take care of! On many days he should be satisfied with a bunch of bananas and couple of coconuts which devotees would have offered to him. Most of the times, I have seen him sitting alone in the temple, but with a lot of enthusiasm, chanting Sanskrit and Tamil slokas. Crowd or no crowd made no difference to him.

Arun Sastry performed all rituals and conducted the ear piercing ceremony in a traditional way. He had to spend couple of hours at Sevalaya and when he was

packing up his things, it was time for us to give his "Dhakshina" (the payment we make to the priest). I put some betel leaves and fruits and coconuts and a 500 rupee note on a plate and offered it to him. He just touched the plate and said "You are doing this function for the underprivileged girls. Let this money be my contribution. If you insist on giving me any Dhakshina, please give me just one rupee". He was happy to receive one rupee for his two hours of service and walked away.

The follow up training covered the nuances involved in stitching various types of garments perfectly besides motivation, self confidence and leadership skills.

Pooja also supervised the classes conducted by the trainers for the garment section of the community college, to be sure that the lessons were well absorbed.

Says S. Kaveri, a trainer: "This was a new level of learning garment making. This training has given me confidence to become a good entrepreneur".

K. Laila is the tailoring trainee in the Sevalaya's newly opened community college. At the age of 40 she has got an opportunity to learn tailoring which is her long lasting dream. She says with full happiness" My dream has come true after joining the college. I never expected that I will sit in the tailoring machine and stitch clothes".

Tough life

Laila shared her past years with us. She got married to K. Kothandam against her parents wish. She left her parents and started a new life with her husband but later she realized she had made a big blunder of marrying him. Her days passed with regular beatings and fight with her drunken husband and she left him one day when her daughter was very small. She came to her mother's house with her three children. For her livelihood she started to work as a helper in a garment manufacturer in Ambattur. She wished that she wanted to become a tailor and in the free time she used to sit in the machines and try the pedaling. She couldn't become a tailor because she didn't know it properly.

Days passed but her wish to become a tailor could not be fulfilled. So she decided to quit her job and joined Sevalaya's tailoring centre before 5 years. Her training could not be completed due to the financial need of her family. So she stopped the training in one month. She cannot even join in any part time courses due to the fee charged there and the qualification they require. After 5 years now she has got an opportunity to join the community college without fees and any qualification.

Community College: vocational training for school dropouts



Community College is Sevalaya's latest initiative to inclusiveness through informal education. Functioning since February 2014, it is proving to be an unexpected ray of hope for rural youth who have had to forego formal school education, for whatever reasons. No doubt, the dropout rate in the Sevalaya school is remarkably low, but those who fail to finish school do not qualify for admission to ITIs that offer vocational courses. This realisation led to the setting up of the Community College which does not hold lack of formal education against a candidate.



The accent is on making the students competent. The training is practical in its orientation. Industry experts are being roped in to give practical tips through guest lectures. Partnership with industry is seen as integral to the unique value addition, be it through industry visits,

internship or placements. Importantly, Sevalaya's training will come with grooming, including etiquette, Functional English and communication skills as also customer servicing skills.

Of the five trades, beautician course has 24 students, from teen aged girls to married women with no educational qualification. Garment cutting has 23 students, some of them attending classes with their little kids. Carpentry has 3 students while Electrician trade has 30 students, AC and refrigeration has 15 students.

Light at the end of the tunnel



A.llangovan is a carpentry student at Sevalaya's Community College. He is 27 years old.

Ilangovan's father M. Angamuthu is a daily wage earner and mother goes for the 100 day wages work.

Physically challenged Ilangovan has been a burden to his parents. He did not go for any work and all the time he was at home. He had stopped studies after his 5th standard.

When he learnt about the carpentry course, he grabbed the unexpected opportunity to exit the deadend in his life.

He says "I also have a life now. After my course I will get a fairly good job. I can then take care of my family".

Medical Centre brings emergency care closer to villagers

Kasuva village where Sevalaya set up its operations in 1988, is a remote village 42 kms west of Chennai city and 22 kms away from the head quarters of Tiruvallur district. The village never had even the basic medical facilities, forcing the people to go the district head quarters for medical treatment. The nearest Public Health Centre at Puliyur is 3 kms away and functions only from 8 AM to 1 PM. To mitigate the situation, a small medical centre was started in 1994.

The centre started with Siddha medicines in the beginning when doctors from Arignar Anna Siddha Medical College used to visit monthly once and do the screening and the treatment for the villagers and the children. Gradually, the centre developed when doctors of various specialties such as Eye, Dental, ENT and General started visiting the Centre to do screening.

When old age home was started in 2002, the Centre proved very useful to the elder residents. They could be rushed to the centre in the night and treatment given to them.

As Nagarajan, the old age care taker recollects, "There were so many nights when we had taken the elders to the medical centre when their BP used to go high and for their asthmatic attacks. Medical centre was a boon to us during the nights and we used to do the first aid and then take them to the hospital in Tiruvallur".

The school teachers also shared the experience of taking Mohan, a Sevalaya pupil, who broke his hand and dislocated a bone. The boy was given first aid by



keeping the bone in position using a scale and tying a bandage. The boy was then taken to the hospital for further treatment.

Nagarajan said that there were so many such experiences that had brought tears in his eyes and the role played by the staff in the medical centre was amazing.

A recent episode that emphasised the role of the Centre was was that of D. Munirathnam who lives not far from Sevalaya. One day, late in the evening,

his seven month old infant developed breathing problem due to congestion in lungs. The family did not know what to do. Then they remembered the Medical Centre and came running with the child. The on-duty nurse Elavarasi assessed the situation and gave an injection which brought immediate relief to the child. The mother, who had been in tears, felt relieved when the child became normal.





Though a crucial outpost at Kasuva village in case of medical emergencies, this life-saving mission will be better served by an ambulance, since a hospital with minimum facilities is 22 kms away, at Thiruvallur.


On behalf of Sevalaya's children and on behalf of sports, shall we say, "Three cheers to the Round Table 95!"

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A large-hearted donor

He has to pay rent for his shop and lives in a rented house. But he is contended with his lot and feels happy that he can meet the needs of his small family.

"I celebrate the birth days of my daughters every year by donating a small part of my earning to feed hungry poor children of orphanages, instead of visiting temples and doing pujas. From my friends and customers I came to know about the good services being rendered by Sevalaya to the destitute children, and I was eager to donate on the birth day of my second daughter" says Anandpandi. Recently when the 1st birthday of his younger child was celebrated, he had to give in to the desires of his family and have a small celebration at his hometown but he was keen on donating money to Sevalaya and immediately after returning he turned up at Sevalaya with a donation of Rs 1,000.
