Yes. I would like to see Santa Claus all 365 days in a year.




NSSCamps

Health Care


Mr. A.Meyyappan conducted a refresher course on Yoga on 29th, 30th and 31st December for our children at the campus as in the previous year.

FEARLESS AND COURAGEOUS

First time visitors to our Sevalaya campus invariably show surprise when they hear the children of our Mahakavi Bharathiar Higher Secondary School sing their morning prayer song. They find it peculiar that it is not a song in praise of the Almighty or one invoking His blessings, but one pledging our resolve to practice a great human virtue, the virtue of fearlessness. The song in Tamil is a composition of Mahakavi Bharathi, one of our guiding lights at Sevalava. He, as well as Swami Vivekananda and Mahatma Gandhi our other two preceptors, saw the greatest of virtues in fearlessness and courage, and constantly preached and practiced the virtue. It is our endeavor to inculcate such virtue in the minds of the children under our care, and the choice of our prayer song is one indication of our endeavor.

Swami Vivekananda was a man of extraordinary courage, and stories of his courage are legion. For example, once while passing alone and unarmed through a jungle in India, he was resting under a tree when suddenly a tiger came by. Swamiji continued in a reclining position, calm and motionless. It was the tiger that sulked and went away!

Swamiji himself used to narrate an early incident that lead to his developing the virtue of fearlessness to such a degree. It happened at Varanasi during Swamiji's wanderings around India as a young monk. He had come out after offering prayers at a temple and was walking towards the adjoining tank. It was a narrow lane with the tank on one side and the high temple wall on the other. Suddenly he was surrounded by a group of large monkeys. They howled and shrieked at him and clutched his feet. In panic Swamiji started running; but the monkeys chased him. An old sannvasi who was a witness to the scene shouted out to him not to run. "Face the brutes", he shouted. Swamiji turned and boldly faced the monkeys. As soon as he did that they fell back and fled. "That was a lesson for all life", Swamiji said recalling the incident, "Face the terrible, face it boldly. Like the monkeys the hardships of life fall back when we cease to flee before them".

"Fearlessness is indispensable for the growth all the other noble qualities in a man", said Mahatma Gandhi, drawing his inspiration from the listing of such qualities as given in Chapter XVI of the Bhagavat Gita, "It richly deserves the first rank assigned to it [in the Gita, as the quality of 'abhaya']". Giving his own definition of abhaya, Gandhiji said: "Fearlessness connotes freedom from all external fear, fear of disease, bodily injury and death, of dispossession, of losing one's nearest and dearest, of losing reputation or giving offence, and so on".

In Gandhiji's own life he displayed the quality in ample measure and on innumerable occasions. When it was a question of standing by and defending his principles, he was absolutely fearless. He displayed no fear of bodily injury when a white racist coachman in South Africa boxed his ears and threatened to break his bones for refusing to sit on the footboard of the coach. He had no fear that he could catch the deadly pneumonic plague when he was attending to the plague-affected Indians during the epidemic in Johannesburg in 1904. He was fearless against imprisonment and beatings. He did fear for his own life when he undertook a fast to bring about unity between Hindus and Muslims in riot-torn Calcutta. Such was the abhaya he practiced.

Bharathi inspired his countrymen through his songs to be courageous. To a nation cowed down by centuries of slavery he songs were soul-stirring. And that brings us back to our prayer song at Sevalaya which runs as follows:

We have no fear! No fear at all! Even if the heavens above were To collapse on our heads We have no fear! No fear at all!

Even if the rest of the world Was to oppose us in unison We have no fear! No fear at all!
