

Love 3 Sevalaya's News Letter - July 2008 Serve 4 Price-Re.1

Dear Friends,

Nearly 12 years ago myself and other trustees of Sevalaya, contacted a building contractor and explained to him our dream school building and asked him to draw a blue print. The contractor looked at me and thought that I must be joking. He said in an unfriendly voice "You are asking for 32 class rooms, 4 labs, one library and an auditorium – do you have any idea how much it will cost? Close to one crore rupees(250,000 USD). So don't waste my time". Then I asked him "How much will it cost to draw the blue print?". The contractor said it will be around Rs 1000 (25 USD). Then I said "Oh! We have that much now, so please give us the plan".

After we got the plan, we relentlessly worked towards making our dream a reality. We constantly spoke to our families, friends, colleagues, contacts about our grand plans. The way the children's Home we started was functioning, inspired confidence and our tireless campaigning started yielding results. The support base was building up.

Seven years later, the school building was fully constructed, at the estimated cost, and now 1000 children get free education in this building. We were happy that we are able to realize our dream and we could somehow muster the one crore rupees required and complete the building.

But in the last two years, we are pushed into a situation that we are not able to admit more children into the school, even though we get many deserving kids seeking admission. This is because the school is full to its capacity and we can't take any more kids. Then the phase II of the dream started – why don't we go beyond the 1000 mark? This will need another school building. But this time the challenge is the availability of land. The entire 7 areas of land are fully utilized now and we need to buy extra land to go for the second school building.

This entire week (June last week), we have been negotiating the purchase of some more land, and by the time this newsletter reaches you, we would have completed the transaction. The blue print for the first stage of the second school building is ready now. The cost is going to be Rs 56,00,000 (140,000 USD). This means each class room will be costing Rs 4 lakhs (10,000 USD) to construct. I am sure we need not wait for seven years to complete this building, as we did in the case of the first building – we are hoping to complete it within one year, so that when the next school year starts in June 2009, we will be ready to welcome 500 more children into the education system.

As we are sure about support from all of you, as soon as we take over the land, we plan to lay the foundation and start the construction work. We will report about this in our next month's news letter. Any contribution, big or small, one class room or a block of class rooms, one fan, one light, one door, one window, or one brick will all count. We can all pool in our resources and make a difference to 500 more kids' lives, on an ongoing basis.

Haiku, Bharathi and economy of words.

Mahakavi Subramania Bharathiyar lived in age when communication systems and news channels were not as developed as they are now. Yet, surprisingly he displayed an intimate knowledge of world events and trends in his essays, poems, editorials cartoons and other writings. His writings included a wide gamut of events and trends. To cite a few: Mazzini's orations, greetings to Belgium, the plight of Indian women laborers in the sugarcane plantations in Fiji Island, Floods in Paris, war between Morocco and Spain, Russian Revolution, China's intrusion in to Tibet, other events in Persia, Turkey etc. He kept himself abreast of and wrote about literary trends elsewhere in the world.

Haiku is a Japanese poetry form. It is known for its brevity. This type of poems was first introduced to Tamil by writer Sujatha in 1966 when he translated a few haikus in to Tamil and published them in the literary journal Kanaiyazhi. Now this Haiku form is very popular in Tamil literature. It is amazing that Bharathiyar wrote about the short form of Japanese poetry in Swadesamitran under the heading "Japanese poetry" on 16/10/1916. That is half a century before this form found its entry in to Tamil world. In his article, Bharathiyar refers to an article by a Japanese poet in Modern review where he wrote about how short Japanese poems were. One poem quoted by him, freely runs like this:

Ravaged in flames! How tranquil like a Falling flower!

This poem purports the state of mind of a Gnani (a man of wisdom) who is as tranquil as a flower even in the midst of gravest of calamities. Incidentally Indian literature speaks of king-sage Janaka possessing such a state of mind.

Sujatha tersely defines Haiku as" Three lines; two frames: and a wonder!" Bharathiyar admires the Japanese literature for its economy of words. He refers to Tirukkural in Tamil but regrets that in recent times our literature has become mere verbose.

Bharathiyar might not have written Haikus. But a few pieces of his, we find have the characteristics of haiku.

Look at these three consecutive axioms in Puthiya Athi chudi.:

Think good.
Toil through the day.
Desired shall come to pass.

Another much more appropriate example will be the "Fire-chick" (agginik kunju)

Found a fire-chick; Placed in a hole in the forest; Forest smouldered cleanaway! (Translation:TNR)

Thaththarikida Thatharikida Thiththom! adds to the wondrous effect. Of course we have to leave the line conveying the bard's comment that in fiery valour is there a thing like fledgling or age-worn?

We come to the central theme of Bharathiyar's article. It commends on the economy of words. While on the subject of economy of words, we cannot but quote Gandhiji:

"My hesitancy of speech which was once an annoyance is now a pleasure. Its greatest benefit has been that it has taught me the economy of words. I can now give myself the certificate that a thoughtless word hardly ever escapes my tongue or pen. I do not recollect ever having had to regret anything in my speech or writing I have thus been spared of many a mishap and waste of time."



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
