## Sevalaya's News Letter

Dear Friends,

Chennai was the venue of a spectacular air show last month. As usual the show was great, but the basic arrangements for the show, called for lot of improvement and planning. As the planes moved swiftly in the air, the bi-cycles and the two wheelers and the cars on the roads were moving at snails pace, as the traffic arrangements for the show was very poorly managed. Naturally there were lot of children in the crowd who had come to witness the show. Many of them were lost in the crowd, as the parents and teachers were also busy staring at the skies. After the show, there was chaos everywhere as the traffic on the road wanted to move at full speed, as the parents realized that the children were missing etc. Fortunately many parents and teachers were able to find their kids and go home after a long wait. But one child went missing and could not be located.

Two days later it was found that a road side cobbler couple was taking care of this lost child. The cobbler found this child on the streets, after all the crowd that came to watch the air show slowly walked away. The child was unable to give its address or the name of the parents. The cobbler not knowing what to do with the child, went on a bi-cycle ride through the streets and lanes of the city, expecting that at some location the child will be able to identify its home! The couple took care of the child for two days most probably a family, which will find it difficult even to feed its own family members this new child would have been an extra burden. But they didn't mind it! After he failed in his efforts to locate the parents, based on the advice given by others, the cobber has approached the police, who in turn located the parents and handed over the child. It is quite understandable that the cobbler was hesitant to approach the police in the first place, as there is always an understandable fear in the mind of poorer sections of Indian population with regard to police.

This cobbler is not running any organization for the welfare of the children, he is not a member of any club, he is not after popularity (even his name was not reported in the press!), he would not have attended any seminar on child welfare, but he has done the right thing at the right time. Making a tour of Chennai on bi-cycle for two days, in the hot Sun, with a child on the back seat, is a major task. For a poor family to accommodate one more person for two days in their house, if they have a house, is a much bigger task. And all this was done without expecting any reward or recognition.

Selfless service is a message we often find in the writings of Mahatama Gandhi, Swami Vivekananda & Mahakavi Bharathi. Service to others need not always involve millions of dollars and sacrificing one's life for it. Simple service as rendered by this cobbler family, if done by all, then there will not be even a need for 'organized service'.

Doing your duty, even going beyond the call of duty, without worrying about the 'fruit of the action' is the central message of Bhagavat Gita. This cobbler family has shown us an example of such an action.

### THEIR SISHYAS

All of us at Sevalaya, be they Trustees or teachers, little children in the foster home or senior citizens at the Old Age Home, are taught to look upon ourselves as humble students of the lives and teachings of our three preceptors Swami Vivekananda, Mahatma Gandhi and Mahakavi Subramaia Bharati. Ideally, we should be able to describe ourselves as their disciples or to use the Indian term, 'their sishyas'. But given our woeful shortcomings, we know that we are nowhere near reaching that exalted state. We are content to remain their humble students and that is honour enough for us.

But there have been great persons in the past who came very near to, or were even actually called as, the sishyas of our preceptors. Swami Vivekananda had such a sishya. He got the sishya when he was on a lecture tour in England in November 1895, and he was delivering a series of lectures on Vedanta in London. He noticed a young woman who was invariably seated in the front row, extremely attentive to the lectures and was an enthusiastic participant in the 'questions & answers' sessions that followed the lectures. When Swamiji said in one of his lectures "Selfishness, ignorance and greed of individuals are the evils that bring suffering to the world ", the words pierced her mind and heart. The young Irish woman, whose name was Margaret Nobel, decided to follow the Swamiji and go to India. Swamiji told her that there would be a tremendous amount of work for her to do among the women of India, and she gladly agreed to take on the burden.

She landed in India in January 1898. In March Swamiji initiated her to sannyasa, and gave her the name 'Nivedita' meaning 'one dedicated to God'. Sister Nivedita took to the simple life of a sannyasini, and started working for the upliftment of the Indian women. When Swamiji died in 1902 she felt added responsibility. She started writing and lecturing on the problems of India and her women. She realized that political freedom was the essential first step if India were to reach her

destiny of greatness and power, and worked tirelessly to inspire Indians to win their freedom from foreign rule. She emphasized the need for unity among Indians. Unfortunately, the pressures of tireless campaigning started telling on her health, and she died in 1911 at the age of 44.

Mahatma Gandhi had such a galaxy of great men as followers that he had not one but many sishyas. There were men like Jawaharlal Nehru, Vallabhai Patel, Rajaji, Maulana Azad and Rajen Babu who left lives of wealth and comfort to become his sishyas in politics, and suffered innumerable hardships, including long terms of imprisonment. Among them, Nehru was Gandhiji's own choice for the number one slot. Speaking at a meeting of the All India Congress Committee in January 1942 Gandhiji said: "Not Rajaji but Jawaharlal will be my successor. ... When I am gone he will speak my language". It is now well known history that Nehru successfully carried on the torch handed over to him by the Mahatma and built India into a united and democratic nation that stands poised today for a great future.

Subramania Bharati's life was so short and 'hurried' that there was hardly any time for him to choose a sishya in his lifetime. There were always groups of followers and admirers around him but hardly anyone to qualify as a sishya. One of them even took on a name that can be roughly translated as "One In Humble Servitude Of Bharati" but neither his poetry nor the politics he followed later in life justified such a name. One who came nearest to being Bharati's sishya was the great Tamil poet Namakkal Ramalingam Pillay. 'Namakkal Kavignar' as he is popularly known, was a product of the Gandhian era of India's freedom struggle even as Bharati was of the Tilak era. Famous for the stirring lyrics of his emotionladen poetry, Namakkal Kavignar wrote on the eve of the launch Gandhiji's Salt Satyagraha:

A battle without sword and bloodshed is coming! Join ye all who believe in the eternity of truth.
