Asian Paints In 4th CSR project

Rs 6 lac donated for rainwater harvesting infrastructure

Sevalaya's 18 acres Kasuva campus is now fully Rainwater Harvested with around 15 recharge wells being constructed to save rain water and increase the ground water level. This new project worth Rs.6 lakhs is sponsored by Asian Paints and executed by Akash Ganga Trust.

The recharge wells of 15 feet depth and 4 feet diameter each, are dug in the school area, boys and girls hostel area,

medical centre, community college, staff quarters and old age home.

Inaugurating the project Dr.Sekhar Raghavan, First Trustee of Akash Ganga Trust said that in a year roughly Chennai gets 130 cms of rainfall and most of the water is not used properly. Through this rainwater harvesting it is estimated that per day 120 litres of water per person can

be saved and can be used for drinking and other purposes.

In Sevalaya's boys home and girls home the rain water is collected through a pipe, filtered and collected in a sintex tank. This water can be used for drinking purposes. He also said that in this total campus 1.93 crore litres of water can be harvested per year.

The Chief Guests for the function Pratyush Unnikrishnan, and C. Sanjeevikumar – Manager – Production from Asian Paints recalled Asian Paints company's successful partnership with Sevalaya for many CSR Projects. "The current Rain water harvesting project will improve the ground water level in these areas", they mentioned.

300 daily wage earning mothers honored on Mothers' Day



Mother's day celebration is never heard off in small villages, that too by mothers who spend long days in brick kilns and agricultural fields as daily "coolies". They toil in the hot sun, win their daily bread and busy getting beaten up by their drunken husbands in the evening. They have no time for any celebration. Nearly 300 such mothers were brought together by Sevalaya, as all their children are studying in Sevalaya's school, for a daylong celebration of their motherhood. The program was sponsored by SCOPE international.

Mothers, along with their children started arriving around 9 AM on 25th April, Saturday, in Sevalaya campus. Around the same time six bus loads of SCOPE volunteers also arrived. The village woke up to see dozens of cars coming into Sevalaya, bringing in top executives of SCOPE. By 10 AM, they

were all grouped into 30 teams. Each team had village mothers, their children, SCOPE volunteers, Sevalaya women staff and grandma's staying in Sevalaya's old age home. The teams were assigned one festival of India, like Deepavali, Pongal, Christmas, Independence Day, Gandhi Jayanthi etc and were asked to prepare models, make rangoolis, songs, dance etc, to bring out the theme of the festival. They were all given one hour time for preparation. SCOPE executives and Sevalaya management team were the judges and they went around the grounds and visited all 30 stalls put by the teams. The top teams were given awards.

"This is a unique idea to bring poor village ladies, their children and ladies from SCOPE, who are educated software engineers, to work together and present models, rangollies etc, and also sing and dance together. The team work makes



them understand each other and poor mothers get a chance to feel proud about their motherhood" said, Yashwant Nagal-akshmi, CSR head of SCOPE.

All the mothers were presented with nice saries. After the presentation hot steaming vegetable briyani and sweets were served to all.

"I always thought that being a poor mother in a village is a curse. No one appreciates me for bringing up my children all on my own, against all odds. Today I feel somebody has realized this and I was in tears when I was called on the stage to receive my gift. The love and affection shown by Sevalaya to my children and the entire village community is the biggest gift we have all got" said one of the mothers, wiping away her tears.

P A Seshan: Going strong at 101

Successive generations of The Hindu newspaper readers got their primer on financial matters and later their regular updates, from one source: Leo. The man behind that pen name is P A Seshan, former Financial Editor of the Hindu, acknowledged as the Bheeshma Pithamaha of financial journalism. He took in his stride the loss of vision and with passion built a remarkable career lasting six decades. At 101, he is busy with social work, as President of all the major socio cultural organisations in Palamadai, his home town that he is deeply committed to. He is also the President of Pattamadai based institutions including Sri



Venkatachalapathy Seva Samithi and the Governing body of a 130 year old local school. He considers himself fortunate to have had “an interesting career”. He is proud of his career, and proud of the achievements of his children and grand children. An ardent devotee of Sringeri Sharada Peetam, Seshan actively participates in its activities.

On the objectives of financial journalism.

I tried to be of service to my readers. It was important that I was incorruptible, to deliver that service.

On people who shaped his career.

My uncle, then Editor of Calcutta- based Indian Finance was responsible for my entry into journalism. I learnt by working with him. Later, at the Hindu, (former Editor) G Kasturi was most supportive as a mentor.

On his visual impairment.

Doctors had warned me about it, so when I started to lose my eye sight, there was no shock. People say I compensated that with my mental alertness and memory. (Even to this day, Seshan listens to all the AIR news bulletins during the day)

On his longevity.

Many of my family elders have lived up to 90 – 93. I am the first to cross 100. There was no special diet, just regular habits. Keeping my mind alert must have helped. I keep myself busy with social work.

On Sevalaya. It is a challenging task you have undertaken. Had I heard about Sevalaya earlier, I would have been a donor from then.

Teacher’s Competency Training



Teacher’s Competency Training :

Teacher competency building is a very important area for improving quality education. This is more so in Rural schools where it is difficult to find competent teachers.

LionBridge Technologies, Sevalaya’s CSR partner, came forward to fund this project.

The main objectives of this program are to improve Computer Competency, Functional English Competency and Subject Matter and Innovative Pedagogy competency of the teachers. External trainers conduct training, on Saturday, Sunday, and one week day. Experienced Teachers from industry design the curriculum

Functional English :

The teachers in rural schools have studied in Vernacular medium, so their English competencies are very low. They are not in a position to comprehend the content which is available in the net. Sevalaya believes in laying a strong foundation for teachers and students in functional English. Hence two teachers are

appointed to teach teachers functional English.

Computer competency :

As there is a lot of content available in the net, teachers should know the basics of computers, surfing the net and picking out the content required for them. Special computer classes are arranged for the teachers so that they can learn these skills

Teaching methodology :

Once the teachers know how to download from the net and how to read and understand the content, then comes the delivery part in the class. Experienced teachers and educational professionals are invited to Sevalaya to take classes to our teachers. They learn better teaching methodology so that the classes can be made interesting.

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The shock that changed the course of his life

In his Autobiography, Gandhiji writes of an indiscretion committed by him while at Bombay after his return from England. He refers to its consequences and also summarizes the lesson learnt by him from this episode.

His brother had been a secretary and adviser to the Ranasaheb of Porbunder. He is alleged to have given a wrong advice to the Ranasaheb, and hence had fallen into disfavour with the political agent who was a British officer. Gandhiji had known this officer while at England, and their terms could be said to be friendly. Gandhiji's brother wanted him to put in a good word with the officer, so that he could favorably decide the case. Gandhiji was totally against such interference. But on the insistence of his brother, Gandhiji met the officer, totally against his will, and compromising his self

respect. The result was disastrous.

The officer bluntly told Gandhiji, "Your brother is an intriguer. I want to hear nothing more from you. If your brother has anything to say, let him apply through proper channel." In spite of this, blinded by self interest, Gandhiji went on arguing. The officer was in no mood to listen. He ordered the peon to lead him out. Still, Gandhiji would not yield. The peon had to place his hands on the shoulders of Gandhiji and push him out of the room. Smarting under the insult, Gandhiji immediately shot out a note to the officer, " you have insulted me. You have assaulted me through your peon. If you do not make amends, I shall have to proceed against you." Pat came the reply: " You were rude to me. I asked you to go out and you would not. I had no option but to order my peon to show the

door. Even after he asked you to leave the office, you did not do so. He therefore had to use just enough force to send you out. You are at liberty to proceed as you wish."

A legal luminary, Pheroza Shah Mehta, whom Gandhiji contacted, advised him simply to pocket the insult and be done with it. In his view, Gandhi had yet to know life. Gandhiji sums up the episode like this:

"The advice was as bitter as poison to me, but I had to swallow it. I pocketed the insult, but also profited by it. 'Never again shall I place myself in such a false position, never again shall I try to exploit friendship in this way', said I to myself, and since then I have never been guilty of a breach of that determination. This shock changed the course of my life."
