## Board results: 100% in Std XII, 99.3% in Std X

For the seventh time, Sevalaya's Mahakavi Bharathiyar Higher Secondary School for the rural underprivileged children has secured 100% pass results in the XII Std Board Examination, held in March 2016.

All 143 students who appeared for the exams were successful. 12 students scored above 1000 and 55 students

passed with distinction while 69 secured first division marks.

In the X Std Board Examination held in March 2016, the children secured 99.3% pass results, with one lone child failing.

152 out of 153 students who appeared for the exams were successful. 7students scored above 450 and 105 students passed with distinction while 139 secured first division marks.

### Std XII Toppers: 3 first generation students, all girls, secure 1-2-3 rank

S Poornima, the first ranker with a total of 1128, is the daughter of a mason. Her mother who works for daily wages has been a pillar of support in encouraging her to study, as a result of which she is the first girl child in her family to complete Std. XII. mistakes in each test paper. My dream is to become a Chartered Accountant."

Although very quiet in class, she never hesitates to approach the teachers even after school hours, to clear her doubts. Dear Friends,

Once again Sevalaya children have proved that underprivileged children from the villages can do equally well in academics if proper facilities are given to them. A school with proper classrooms, laboratories, equipments, books, note books, other learning kits, library and above all caring teachers, will make sure that children who have lost both parents, children with single parents, children from broken families, children from bonded labourer families, children who have criminal background and left under the care of Sevalaya under Juvenile Justice act, children from very poor village families can also do well in 12th and 10th grade exams. On the day the 12th grade exam results came out, the school was like a temple where festivals were going on. Along with the students who came to see their results, we also had alumni members and children from the next batch, eagerly waiting to see the results. Same was the case for 10th grade results too. Sevalaya once again achieved 100% results in 12th grade and 99.3% in 10th grade.

When we look at the results considering they are all first generation learners, we can understand the effort put in by the teachers. Good facilities in this village have been made possible by generous contribution by people like you. When you see that every paisa donated by you has been put to good use and has resulted in good outcome, you can experience the joy of giving. Sevalaya thanks you for your continuous support in the last 28 years. This year also we have 2000 such children, who need your support. To get the initial requirements of two sets of uniforms, notebooks and other educational kits, we need an average of ₹1000 per child. ### **Training on Leadership in Education**

Training in Educational Leadership is a programme of Kuruvila Jacob Initiative for Promoting Excellence in School Education managed by the Kuruvila Jacob Memorial Educational Trust.

The training conducted in 3 sessions spread over a year, focussed on Facilitative leadership, Instructional Leadership and Institutional Leadership. Topics covered included communication, challenges for the modern leader, time management, motivation, team learning, curriculum designing, lesson designing, instructional effectiveness, HR management, Office Management, Management cycle and TQM (Total Quality Management). Sevalaya was the only NGO participant in this programme in which 17 schools participated.



### "Indian Opinion"

The journal Indian Opinion was started in 1904 to serve as a means of communication amongst the Indian community in South Africa. Though Gandhiji was not technically the editor of the journal, he was actually carrying on with the entire work; the financial burden also entirely fell on him. He writes about his experience with the journal, which will be a lesson to all of us in the present generation on ethical and responsible journalism. He writes:

"I cannot recall a word in those articles set down without thought or deliberation, or a word of conscious exaggeration, or anything merely to please. Indeed the journal became for me training in self- restraint, and for friends a medium through which to keep in touch with my thoughts. The critic found very little to which he could

object. In fact the tone of Indian Opinion compelled the critic to put a curb on his own pen. Satyagraha would probably have been impossible without Indian Opinion. The readers looked forward to it for a trustworthy account of the Satyagraha campaign as also of the real condition of Indians in South Africa. For me it became a means for the study of human nature in all its casts and shades, as I always aimed at establishing an intimate and clean bond between the editor and the readers. I was inundated with letters containing the outpouring of my correspondents' hearts. They were friendly, critical or bitter, according to the temper of the writer. It was a fine education for me to study, digest and answer all the correspondence. It was as though the community thought audibly through this correspondence with me.

It made me thoroughly understand the responsibility of a journalist, and the hold I secured in this way over the community made the future campaign workable, dignified and irresistible.

In the very first month of Indian Opinion, I realized that the sole aim of journalism should be service. The newspaper press is a great power, but just as an uncontrolled pen serves but to destroy. If the control is from without, it proves more poisonous than what of control. It can be profitable only when exercised from within. If this line of reasoning is correct, how many journals in the world would stand the test? But who would stop those that are useless? And who should be the judge? The useful and the useless must, like good and evil generally, go on together, and man must make his choice."

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
