Bharathi-Gandhi-Vivekananda are Sevalaya's inspirational fountainheads since inception. Each year, a combined event is organised on September 11, which is a significant day in the lives of the Trinity. It was on 11th September 1921 Mahakavi Bharathiyar passed away. On the same day in 1906 Gandhiji coined the word Satyagraha for the new technique to fight against oppression. On 11th September 1893, Swamy Vivekananda delivered the historic speech at World Parliament of Religions at Chicago.

On September 11 every year Sevalaya organizes an event BGV (Bharathi Gandhi Vivekananda) Day. Various competitions including oratorical, poetry, quiz competition, on the lives and works of the three leaders, for school and college students in Thiruvallur, Kancheepuram and Chennai are conducted. This year around 500 students from 35 schools and 8 colleges participated in these competitions.

C Meena, Social Welfare Officer, Thiruvallur district, Government of Tamilnadu, was the Chief Guest on the occasion and distributed prizes and certificates to the winners of the competitions.

Selvi has been working in the campus for 5 years. She has single handedly managed to keep all the toilets and bathrooms clean in the girls' hostel and the oldage home. Apart from that, she also clears the colour coded dustbins used to segregate the wastes into degradable and non-degradable categories. She doubles up to work in the kitchen and dining room during lunch and dinner to serve food for the senior citizens in the dining hall.

Out of her own free will, she stands near the wash area during the lunch break and watches the plates of those students who come to the wash area. She is quite a stickler for non wastage of food and either nudges the students not to waste food or watches over the students who try to throw the food away. She says, "We all struggle very hard for our daily morsel



and we should not waste a single grain. It is better if the kids fill their plates little by little – that way, they won't waste it. I also insist everyone washes up their plates. It is a simple discipline that all of us should practice. After all, this is what we all do at home – so why not do it here?"

"I love working here in Sevalaya. I don't like to miss even one day of work and even if I do, I keep thinking about everyone in the old age home. My husband sometimes wonders why I think about Sevalaya so much; but I do, because, I love this place. This place gives me a lot of peace and happiness." Asked about the one thing she would like to see in the near future, she unhesitatingly replies, nice paved tar roads within the campus with lovely flowering plants on either side. I am sure, it is just a matter of time." Selvi says, before signing off.

"I am treated with respect and the children from the hostel and school come

occasionally and spend time with us. They are like our own grandchildren. We have reached a stage in our lives where we can offer unconditional love to the children."

He turns melancholic and says, "I always pray to God to keep all of Sevalaya family well."

Indians first, all of us!

In these columns, we are looking at some of the highlights in the life of Swami Vivekananda, as also the various incidents, events and situations in his life which shaped him as the ultimate Swamiji.

Swamiji's outlook underwent some changes since he started out from Baranagore as a wandering monk. Of these, his biographers write:

The Swami was tirelessly in search of unity in the world of Indian ideals. He finally came to see that underlying all the diversity of customs and traditions was the oneness of the spiritual vision. The differences between the Muslim and Hindu worlds he found to be more apparent than real; for the Muslims as a race were as generous and human, and at as Indian, as the Hindus. The enlightened among them appreciated Hindu culture, and were aware that there was an affinity between Sufism and Advaita Vedanta. To him Muslims and Hindus were Indians first; hence the distinction between them by reason of their different beliefs was subordinate to their identity as compatriots.

The Swami's horizon had now so widened that he saw the intrinsic perfection, and could sympathize with the aspirations, of all forms of religion. He saw that, given a spirit of brotherhood, the peoples and sects and castes of India could unite in an organized civil life, especially if a feeling of responsibility to the poor were cultivated by the educated classes. He felt that the choice of religious ideal, and the practice of it, should be a personal matter, neither affecting, nor affected by the affairs of the State; and further, that the several latterday religious movements which were tinged with Western religious thought or Western culture, were also, though perhaps unconsciously, contributing to the crystallization of the modern transition. It was his hope that, with more discrimination between essentials and non-essentials, sectarian bitterness would die out and all would join together in the common task of reappraising and restarting, according to modern needs, the content and significance of the ancient Indian culture.
