She started her career as a school
teacher and retired as a head mistress.
She is now 80 years old. Her husband
passed away 20 years ago. After that she
was living with her son, Dr Karthikeyan.
But, as fate willed it, Dr Karthikeyan
met with an accident while constructing
his house, and passed away. This left
Ponmanidevi all alone.

On seeing Ponmanidevi's condition, her sister, Marathal, came to her rescue. So Ponmanidevi moved to her sister's place. Marathal and her son started taking care of Ponmanidevi.

In 2006, when the Department of Backward Classes, Most Backward

Classes and Minorities Welfare,
Government of Tamilnadu planned to
construct hostels for poor children,
Ponmanidevi readily donated 2 cents
of her land to the government. With
this donation, the village got free hostel
facility for the underprivileged children.
In 2015, when the girls school in the
village applied for upgradation from high
school to higher secondary, Ponmanidevi
again helped by donating ₹ 2 lakhs to the
education Department and finally higher
secondary section was started.

With Ponmani devis's support Std XI was started but the school needed more land to construct classrooms for Std XII. Once again Ponmanidevi came forward and donated 1 acre of her land, which is worth 4 crores. With this donation, Std XII

can be now be started.

More such donations may be forthcoming in the future by this magnanimous lady!

"I want to do good as long as I live" says Ponmanidevi. Recently she was honoured for all her good deeds in a function, where Education Minister participated and appreciated her generosity.

But she is just a simple village lady, not expecting any rewards or publicity. She is only looking for more opportunities to help her village children. Ponmanidevi is a living example of how personal tragedy can be converted so beautifully into public good. India lives because of such people.

Dyslexia training

Madras Dyslexia Association conducted expansive training sessions for the teachers of to identify and teach dyslexic children. Seven sessions were held each Saturday, beginning December 2017. Training was imparted on how to teach the dyslexic children to read, write, and learn spellings, in English and Tamil and to teach Mathematics. Emphasis was laid on teaching basic phonetics to the dyslexic children. Once the children have this foundation, it will be easier for them to pronounce words, and use rhyming words and expand their knowledge step by step.

When it came to Math, the teachers were asked to make use of flash cards, repetitive numbers and patterns which improved the chances of the children's better learning.

40 Primary school teachers benefitted from these sessions. The impact is likely to reach about 150 children.

Prison life-1909

Gandhiji was ordered on January 15, 1909 by the Police Officer in Volkrust to produce his registration certificate and to give means of identification. He failed to do it, and was produced before the Magistrate who ordered that he be removed from the Colony. He was then removed and left at a spot at the border, a quarter of a mile away. But he defiantly returned almost immediately. He was rearrested, but no charge sheet was issued. He proceeded to Johannesburg.

Gandhiji along with seven others was sentenced at Volkrust on February 25, 1909, as they refused to produce certificates of registration, and to give fingerprints. They were to pay a fine of 50 pounds each or to undergo three months' imprisonment with hard labour. All of them preferred to go to jail instead of paying the fine. Gandhiji made a statement in the court. He said, "I consider myself as the greatest offender

in the Asiatic struggle, if the conduct I am pursuing is held to be reprehensible, I ask you to impose on me the highest penalty."

Gandhiji was released on the morning of May 24 from the Pretoria jail.

Gandhiji's observations on courting jail were:

"The one view is why one should go to jail and there submit oneself to all personal restraints.. Far better to pay up the fine than thus to be incarcerated. May God spare His creatures from such sufferings in jail. Such thoughts make one really a coward, and being in constant dread of a jail life, deter him from undertaking to perform services in the interests of his country which might otherwise prove very valuable.

The other view is that it would be the height of one's good fortune to be in jail in the interests and good name of one's country and religion.

There, there is very little of that misery which he has to undergo in daily life.
There, he has to carry out the orders of one warder only, whereas in daily life he is obliged to carry out the behests of great many more. In the Jail, he has no anxiety to earn his daily bread and to prepare his meals. The government see to all that.

They also look after his health for which he has to pay nothing. He gets enough work to exercise his body. He is freed from all his vicious habits. His soul is thus free. He has plenty of time at his disposal to pray to God. His body is restrained, not his soul. He learns to be more regular in his habits. Those who keep his body in restraint, look after it.

Taking this view of jail life, he feels himself quite a free being. Those who think this way are sure to be convinced that even jail life can be attended with blessings."

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
