It is shocking to note that 99.9% of teachers have failed the teacher eligibility test (TET) this time. These are teachers who are already in service and teaching the same subjects day in and day out. To top it all, these teachers are producing 90% results in the state in board exams of 10th, 11th and 12th grades. How is this possible? If teachers themselves don't know the subject, how come they are able to make the children understand the subject and get such good marks? Does it mean the whole exercise is just fooling people? Thousands of million Indian Rupees are spent on education from tax payers' money and this is the output we get!

Everyday it is reported in media that new classrooms have been constructed, new teaching methods have been introduced, smart classrooms opened, lot of teachers are recruited, uniforms given free, books given free, note books given free, food given free, transport free, everything related to education free in state run schools. And now a days, teachers are

well paid also. But where is the quality of education?

It is also in the media that many state run schools are closed down as the strength is only single digit and hence these schools are getting converted into libraries. If everything is given free, why are people refusing to admit children in Government schools?

The matter is directly related to the future of our country. What are we going to do?

Sevalaya is addressing this issue in a very small negligible way, just in one school run by Sevalaya. But, as of now, we can do only in one school, as we have control only here.

Goals are defined at the beginning of the year and implementation is closely followed up. Increments and promotions are not automatic. There is performance review every quarter and based on the appraisal, the increments and promotions are decided. There are lot of in house training where various subjects are discussed. Teachers are

sent to external training and this costs the organization a lot. They come back from training and implement what they have learnt new. Many experts from all over the world connect online and take classes. Many trips are arranged, many programs arranged for both teachers and children. Retired professors from IIT and other quality institutions come and take classes for our teachers. Many corporate volunteers come and take classes, do career guidance programs, motivational programs. Every week, there is a book review meet where a teacher discusses a book he/she read during the week. Children also do the same. Lot of reading is encouraged and prizes given.

Extra-curricular activities are also encouraged like sports, music, dance, art etc. Many have got college admission under sports quota also.

What Sevalaya has done in one school can be replicated anywhere.

The money they earn is never spent on family. Many of them die at a young age due to excessive drinking. Domestic violence is very common. The children are affected psychologically.

To create an awareness among the students and to ensure that they do not fall prey to this evil, Sevalaya has been

organising Putli Ba Day for the past 4 years.

Putli Ba made her young son Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi, promise her that he would not touch wine, women and meat before she gave him permission to sail to England during August 1888, for further studies.

Hence every year on August 5th Putli Ba day is celebrated. The Chief Guests for the function were A S Sunder Raj, Senior Divisional Manager, LIC of India, and G Ram Mohan, Retd., Railway Safety Commissioner, Indian Railways and Gandhian scholar.

Ram Mohan, who sponsored the event, spoke to children about how Gandhiji

kept up the promise to his mother despite the struggles and peer pressure he faced in England. He emphasised on the sanctity of a promise made. He then administered the oath to the students.


Home Maker turns bread winner

Sutha P, daughter of a petty shop owner found it a struggle to complete 12th std due to the economic situation in the family. She has a younger sister and her father, with his meagre income could not afford to educate his daughters.

Sutha got married to Palavesan, a lorry driver. Her son Mukesh is a differently abled child with a congenital heart problem. Mukesh underwent 2 surgeries. Sutha sold whatever jewellery she had and borrowed heavily for the treatment and surgery. The family reeled under debts.

Though Sutha wanted to support by adding to the family income, she could not get any job as she did not have employable skills. It was then she heard



about Sevalaya offering free training in basic computer applications at the community college in Ravanasmudram.

"I joined the course and my life changed completely. I didn't even know how to switch on a computer. Our instructor Valli Karthika patiently taught me. Not only computers we also had value education sessions at the college. Kanchana Mam conducted a session on Bharathi, Gandhi and Vivekananda and spoke about self confidence. The session was very

motivating. It was a morale booster for me. For the first time, I believed I could overcome my problems.

I finished the course successfully and now I have got a job in Kalyani Photo Studio in Pottalpudur. I look after the administration as well as take photos, print them and attend to all the jobs. I am happy that I am able to contribute financially to my family and confident that we will come out of our debts soon." says a beaming Sutha.

S Dinesh, Head of Vivekananda Unit, Sevalaya, has been selected as a member of the "One Stop Crisis Team" of Thiruvallur District. The committee comprises of senior officials from Judiciary, Police, District Administration, Labour, Social Welfare Department and a trained Social Worker from NGO sector. The main objectives of the committee are creating awareness about the issue of human trafficking and the legal recourse available and ensuring that the rehabilitation schemes by the government reach the victims.



Indians enter South Africa

The English who arrived in South Africa settled at Natal. They found that excellent sugarcane, tea and coffee could be grown in Natal. Thousands of labourers would be required in order to grow such crops in a large scale. But they were handicapped by the want of a stable labour force. They requested the Government of India for help by way of supplying labour. The Government complied with their request. The first batch of indentured labourers reached Natal on 16th November 1860. Mark this date. But for the event on this date, there would have been no Indian settlers in South Africa. No need for Sathyagraha. Perhaps, no scope for the discovery of the Mahatma in the Barrister Gandhi. Gandhiji states that the steamer which carried the labourers to Natal carried with them the seeds of Sathyagraha.

No thought was given to the question as to how the illiterate labourers who had gone to a distant land were to seek redress if they had any grievances. No thought was given to their religious needs or to the preservation of morality. In fact, Indian labourers in Natal had to live a life of semi slavery. Memorials were submitted to the Government of India

which fell in deaf ears.

Following the indentured labourers, Indian traders in Mauritius, who had connections with these indentured labourers, followed them there. An Indian trader opened a shop there. The traders manufactured sugar, and in a surprisingly short time, supplied South Africa with a modest quantity of sugar, tea and coffee. They made much money and built palatial mansions for themselves and turned wilderness into a veritable garden. Hearing the success of Indian traders in Natal, several traders from different parts of India reached Natal. They needed accountants. Accountants from Gujarat and Saurashtra accompanied them. Thus there were two classes of Indians settled in Natal. First free traders and their free servants; and secondly indentured labourers. Again there were children born to indentured labourers. They were also, virtually bonded labourers. The labourers went to Natal under indenture for a period of five years. After this period, they were entitled to work as free labourers, or trade in Natal, and settled there if they wished. They are known as free Indians. Though they were called free Indians, they were not considered

on par with free traders and their free servants. They were required to obtain a pass if they wanted to go from one place to another. If they were married and if they wanted the marriage to be recognized as valid in law, they were required to register the marriage with the Protector of Indian Immigrants. They were also subject to other severe restrictions.

The Indian traders could trade not only with the Indians, but with Negroes, who were feeling comfortable with the Indian traders, than with the English by whom they were subjected to indignities. These traders extended their area of operation to the Boer republics in the Transvaal and the Orange Free State during the eighties of the last centuries. Several traders went to Cape Colony and began to earn fairly well. The Indians were thus distributed in small numbers in all the four colonies

Absolutely free Indians numbered between forty to fifty thousand. The freed labourers and their descendants number about a hundred thousand.

We will proceed next to review their grievances.
