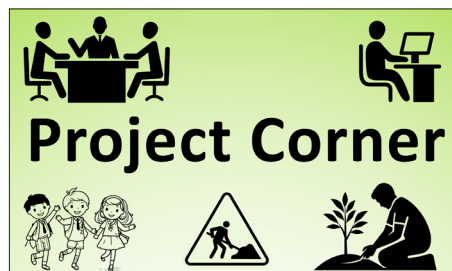

Gold Medal in Teaching – Palanisamy

Palanisamy was born in 1978 at Elakurichi, Ariyalur district. Coming from a humble farming family, he is the first graduate in his family. His father, Govindaswamy, is a farmer, and his mother, Veerammal, supported the family through various odd jobs. He has four sisters. His wife, Nithya, is an Assistant Professor of Physics at Vel Tech, and they are blessed with two daughters, studying in Stds IX and XI.

He studied up to Std X at Periyamarai Government School and completed XI and XII at Ammapalayam, Perambalur district. He then completed B Sc Physics at Government College, Ariyalur and M Sc Physics at National College, Tiruchirappalli. He later completed B Ed in Chennai, securing Distinction and a Gold Medal.

In 2003, Palanisamy joined Sevalaya, when the institution had around 600 students and had just introduced Std XI. He felt deeply connected to Sevalaya's mission of providing free, value-based



education to children.

He is known for his strong commitment to students, especially those facing difficulties. One such student is Rahul, an orphan who studied up to Std X at Sevalaya and later joined another school. Rahul did not clear Physics in Std XII, so Sevalaya supported him in applying for the supplementary examination. Palanisamy provided continuous academic support by explaining concepts during lunch breaks, conducting regular tests, planning his studies, and guiding him closely for nearly two and a half months. With this dedicated guidance, Rahul successfully passed the examination. Today, he is well settled, reflecting the impact of this selfless and consistent support.

After a brief break in 2010, Palanisamy rejoined Sevalaya in 2017 with renewed dedication. He actively promotes quality education and standardisation through his involvement with the Bureau of Indian Standards (BIS). Representing Sevalaya,

he participated in a four day training programme conducted by Bureau of Indian Standards.

Under his guidance, 50 students from Stds IX, X, and XI actively participated in BIS quizzes and awareness programmes. His students have achieved remarkable success, winning 2 National-level prizes and 5 State-level prizes, including top awards at both State and National levels.

Palanisamy believes in selfless service and takes great pride in the safe and nurturing environment at Sevalaya, an opinion strongly shared by parents. He dreams that one day, Sevalaya alumni ("Aalam Vizhuthugal") will take responsibility for nurturing and sustaining Sevalaya.

On the suggestion of Gandhiji, Mahadev read the poem 'Saket' by Maithili Charan Gupta. He was fascinated by the book, which he described as an incomparable charming work. There were some exchanges between Mahadev and Gandhiji in the book. Mahadev's opinion was that the 9th canto of Saket effectively portraying Urmila's pain of separation from Laxman – her husband- was an imitation of Sanskrit poets, while Gandhiji said the subject of the poem was,

"Rama, your life itself is a poem,

That life can possibly make everyone a poet"

Gandhiji commented in one of his letters that Mahadev continued learning French and Urdu even in jail. While discussing languages, Gandhiji and Mahadev vied with each other in their insistence on the correct spellings and on the efforts to understand the origin of words.

Here is an interesting passage by Mahadev.

He asked while writing a letter to Mira Behn, 'what is the spelling of inexhaustible' Is there an 'h' in it or not?

I have written with an 'h'. I also became doubtful, referred to the dictionary wherein 'h' is mentioned. Then he said, 'examine the root of the word, which will clarify it.' The root itself started with an 'h' 'haus' – to draw. Bapu said, 'there are some other such words wherein the 'h' is not there. I said 'exonerate'. Bapu said 'No; it is not. There is an 'h' in it. I said 'it is certainly not there. The root is 'onus'. Bapu said 'The root is 'honour'. I said 'We can bet on it, and I am sure to win.' We referred to the dictionary and I won. The next word was 'inexorable'. He was happy and said 'we learn a lot by knowing the Latin origin of words.

Mahadev states that Gandhiji's replies to queries, in his letters, were noted for their gravity and conciseness. He cites a few examples which remind us of the "Yakshaprasna"

What is the essence of life?

Selflessness

What is the highest ideal?

To rise above the passions

Who is a man?

Only one who has his body under control

Who could be said to be in bondage?

One who believes in 'I'

What is liberation?

Freedom from likes and dislikes

What is hell?

Untruth

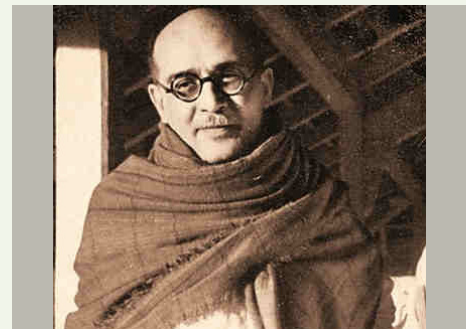
What brings about liberation?
