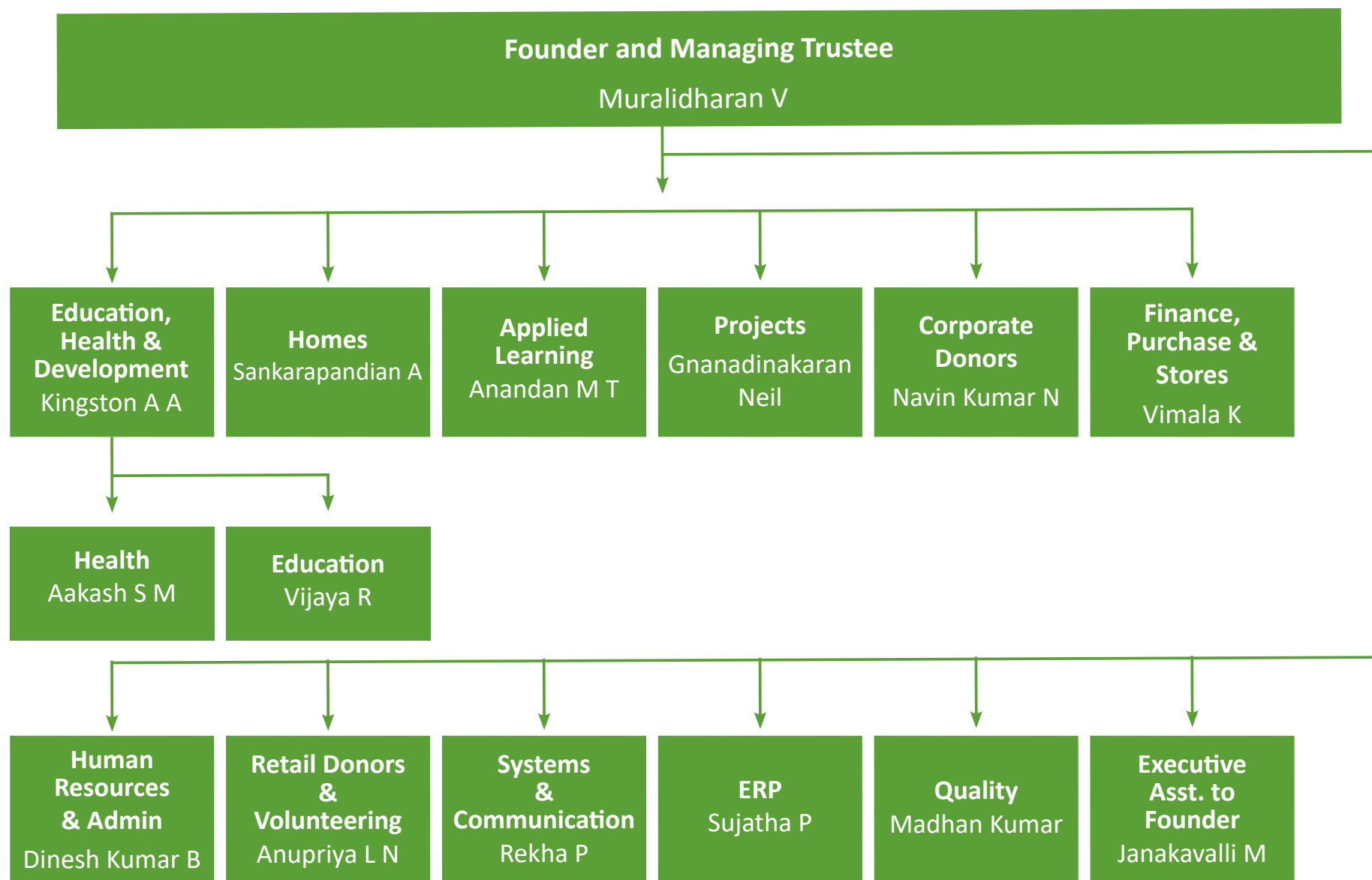

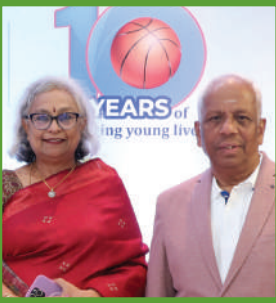

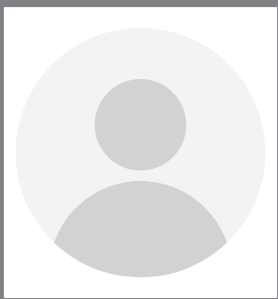

From brick kilns to books

Brick kilns dominated the skyline of Kasuva village, even as late as the 1980s. Migrant labour families were 'sold', for lifelong virtual slavery. The earnings were not enough for repaying the debt and feeding the family. So even the small amounts that children could earn, were welcome. The original inhabitants of the cluster of villages, mostly farm labourers, also found no reason to send children to school.

Sevalaya Home was started in 1988 and the children were sent to outside schools. In 1991, when Sevalaya started its own school, it was almost as difficult to find students as it was to find the resources. It took rounds of persuasion and a lot of persistence, before the villagers found value in education. The winds of change on the wings of education have transformed an estimated 3,000 families in four-dozen contiguous villages. Most of the 4,240+ students have been first generation learners.

By common consensus and his own best guess, Palani is over 70. His father was an agricultural labourer. After his 5th standard, Palani followed his father's occupation. In 1992 Ratna joined him as his wife. She had never studied. Ratna remembers cooking by firewood in a hut lit by a kerosene lamp. Open toilets were the norm. All houses had thatched or tiled roofs along mud roads, with some cycles in view. Then slowly came electricity, roads, foot wear and two wheelers. Children's dresses changed over from worn-out and tattered clothes to neat and clean attire. Studies led to employment, better incomes. Families escaped subsistence life and built concrete houses, reducing farm land and cows grazing. "The whole area is blessed, thanks to Sevalaya", says Palani, summarising the march of urbanisation.

The couple had three children. First son Dilip walked 100 feet to study in the Sevalaya school. A school topper, Dilip did his BE, as did the younger son Sankar. Second child Rajalakshmi also finished BE. She would not have studied, but for Sevalaya. "No girl in the village studied those days. The financial burden and fear of their safety were reasons to keep them at home; Girls started studying, thanks to the Sevalaya school." Meanwhile, with the children growing and needing space, Palani sold 17 cents of land and built a concrete house.

Illnesses were always a big challenge to the villagers: loss of wages, travel plus expenses. Sevalaya's Medical Centre, since 1994, has solved that problem. The community also has the confidence that Sevalaya acts fast with rescue and relief, in case of natural calamities, in the neighbourhood and even afar.

Palani is happy that he did not pick up the drinking habit. He cannot say that about the new generation, although Sevalaya has awareness programmes against alcohol and burning waste.

Nagamma is an 80-year-old widow. She got married when she was 15 years old. The land they own, now has three concrete houses, occupied by the families of their three children. Among her grandchildren is Mohan R, a computer engineer working with TCS. Meanwhile, land prices have zoomed, from ₹ 750 a cent, three decades ago, to ₹ 15 lacs.

Sevalaya also promoted scientific sports and stage performances, both proving instruments of self-discovery and self-confidence. Travel for contests was the first time many children saw the world outside their village. Through a regular stream of international volunteers and teachers, coaches and corporate volunteers, the children learnt about the larger world, firing their ambition. Children being children, the new knowledge and thoughts and habits reached the community through osmosis, bringing in lifestyle changes.



Services to society

Since 1988, Sevalaya has transformed underprivileged communities of Kasuva and its surrounding villages. Expanding operations, Sevalaya has impacted over 1.9 million lives across 7 states through integrated services in education, healthcare, rural development and environment.

Education beyond the subjects

The middle child between sister Vaishali and brother Vallarasu, Vaishnavi has been the “tough one” at home. Vaishnavi joined Sevalaya in her 4th Standard, and soon started participating in the many competitions in Sevalaya – dance, singing, storytelling, public speaking. Sister Vaishali took part only in dance and singing. Going on stage boosted Vaishnavi’s self-belief. Her imagination was fired by the volunteers from Corporates who would visit Sevalaya. She dreamt of working in an airconditioned office and travelling abroad. Better still, a VJ.

In her 8th standard, she gave a speech that surprised her teacher, who was impressed. That was a confidence booster. “Small things can change things”, she says. She started to love the stage even more. “I was deeply inspired by some incredible speakers Sevalaya produced. I kept wishing I could speak like them!. One day, I took the leap and it’s been going great ever since”, explains Vaishnavi. Fortunately for her, her parents encouraged her and did not stop her from travelling to participate in competitions. Father S Ramu is a forklift driver and mother R Vijaya runs a tailoring shop and teaches tailoring. “Our main revenue source” is how she describes her mother. Vaishnavi learnt only the basics of tailoring. Maybe she didn’t give her mother the respect a teacher deserves. Meanwhile, in her exams, Vaishnavi scored in the 80s.

Vaishnavi’s dreams of becoming the first Engineer in her extended family were refreshed when she got admission in the Government quota. Yet, her family couldn’t afford the reduced fees. With support from PPG Asian Paints, facilitated by Sevalaya, her tuition fees for the first two years of college were taken care of. Her family managed the expenses for transportation and books. In her third year, she chose to take an education loan, a decision that instilled in her a strong sense of self-reliance and the confidence to shape her own destiny.

College was a sobering experience as she moved from Tamil-medium schooling to an English-medium environment. Even when she knew the matter, she could not express. Naturally she fell silent, for safety. As a result, “people didn’t recognise my talents”. She was so depressed she wouldn’t even touch the lunch she carried. She asked her mother to change her college. Slowly, the college bus travel opened up friendships. One major miss in her life was not utilising the placement opportunity, partly because of spending time on studies, though it ensured that she did not have any arrears.

When family circumstances forced her to take up a job in a BPO, Vaishnavi used another door that opened up: free personality development classes, from 10 am to 3 pm, followed by night shift, from 5 pm to 3 am! Addressing large audiences boosted her sagging confidence.

After many frustrating interviews, Vaishnavi got into HCL, fortunately in the semiconductor domain she had studied. Vaishnavi’s dreams started to come true, including two stints in Singapore. She became the first engineer from her extended family and also the first traveller abroad. She feels blessed that her exposure at Sevalaya nurtured her passion, provided inspiration, “all of which I stored in my subconscious. Sevalaya gave me education. not just in subjects but in behaviour, discipline, moral values, self-confidence”. Employment is very important “especially for a girl, given the gender inequality. It gives her an income. It gives her respect, independence”. Vaishnavi is active in the Sevalaya Alumni committee that tries to pass on to the current crop, what the school gave them.

Girls education

Sevalaya provides free education (including books and uniforms) to over 1,100 underprivileged girl children every year. This includes many orphaned students who have fought all odds and turned successful professionals. Girls make up a majority of the school students.

Devraj does not remember his parents.

Orphaned at the age of three, he was put in a boy's home. Then its owner took him to Sevalaya for his sixth standard. Initially he was shy, introverted, and would speak to none. Slowly the friendships, the banter, the lighthearted teasing in Sevalaya hostel changed that.

A turning point was when physical director Sankarapandian introduced him to handball. Soon he was in the school team. Devraj remembers a match the school team lost badly to Don Bosco school. The Physical Director only said: “You must understand what went wrong.” The team sat and had a discussion. They realized that there was very little communication within the team. So they found a way. They created nicknames for each other so that they could communicate during play without the opponents knowing the strategy. Devraj also gained from a training course by a Croatian coach that the school had arranged. He soon got addicted to sports, its discipline. That defined his persona, his habits, his consumption choices, all determined by the consciousness that he is a sportsman. On his final day in school, when the farewell function was going on, he was in a long sitting with Sankarapandian. Devraj was sharing his dream: to create a sports foundation to coach underprivileged children free.

Post his Std 12, Devraj did a two-year computer science course, facilitated by a board member of Sevalaya. He also got associated with Sriram Foundation, where he was greatly influenced by a German lady coach who taught holistic sports. Through a FB friend, he got a coach's job in Latvia. He was 17 years old. Devraj got a contract to play for Riga United Football Club, for four years. Devraj did a bachelor's degree in sports science in Latvia. In a mountain adventure course, he had an unforgettable experience. He lived in nature in the raw: 15 days with no packed food, almost Sylvester Stallone style, living on berries and apples.

Then, in 2019, Devraj came back to India as an entrepreneur. His task was to help his friend-through-football and European businessman, Valerie Nikhetin, to expand his edutech company in India. It is an AI-based system that

answers the user's questions like a teacher with limitless patience. Devraj visited over 300 schools in India and got deals from around 30. Soon he realised he was getting obese and out of shape. He decided to get back to sports seriously once again.

In Mumbai and Bengaluru, he found work and grew. Over the weekends he conducted free coaching for around 30 children aged between 8 and 14.

Back in Chennai in 2026, he started Navdev Sports, with his students-turned-coaches Tamilvanan and Rahul as partners. Navdev Sports plans to offer coaching in nine sports, including table tennis, football, basketball and swimming, commercially. Devraj's savings are an assurance, even as they take the help of friends and the “many good people I connected through football.” That helps fund the jerseys, food and sports gear for 10 poor children they train for free. He wishes that more people get involved, as sports helps character building. “It is difficult but makes me happy. Sports taught me how to face challenges and solve problems. I read Vivekananda in the Sevalaya library. He has been an inspiration. Sevalaya also taught me kindness. We are products of kindness.” The joy of realising a long-visualised dream is evident in his voice.



Sports

Sports has been a means to self-discovery and self-confidence for disadvantaged children, producing 43 district/state-level players. Proficiency in sports also facilitates higher studies and employment for over 10% of all Sevalaya students.

The value of value education

Saravanan's story illustrates how childhood and school experiences can shape an individual's principles and life.

Saravanan lives in Pakkam, hardly 2 kms away from school. His two elder sisters and brother were Sevalaya students. His father Palani is a cycle mechanic.

From Balwadi through his 12th, Saravanan studied in Sevalaya School. He believes that the knowledge and absorption capabilities of Sevalaya students are better than that of many matriculation school children. He had high marks in public exams, and scored a first class in his B.Com. Employed by CMA CGM, a logistics company, in Finance and Accounts, Saravanan stands out with his behaviour which he picked up from school. He greets all cheerfully. He will not throw rubbish anywhere. He switches off unnecessary lights. In college, he has had classmates asking him why he should bother about the electricity and water that belonged to the college and his telling them that those were public resources.

In his age group, where rules and procedures are considered a nuisance, what distinguishes Saravanan is, he gives logic a chance. He found value in 5S practices that prescribe workplace discipline. When he entered his teens, he decided to be a teetotaler. Again, not as blind acceptance.

Every week, in two sessions, life stories of the three moral guides of Sevalaya, namely, Mahatma Gandhiji, Mahakavi Bharathiyar and Swami Vivekananda are taught. Sevalaya school observes Putlibai Day by arranging an assembly of children and their mothers. Children make a pledge to their mothers not to drink intoxicants, re-enacting Gandhiji's promise to his mother before he left for England. For Saravanan, it is a choice he had made, based on what he saw around him. "I have enough firsthand knowledge of the tragedy that liquor brings", he says. His close friends are disappointed and feel bad for him that he is not progressive enough to enjoy life. But Saravanan has no problem. He sticks to his principles, no matter what his friends think about it.

Why is it that every child does not imbibe these qualities?

The answer is simple.

Saravanan patiently listens to anything that he hears, then he analyses it and when he finds the real reason, the real value for such practices and rules, he accepts them logically. So, when others think rules are imposition, Saravanan finds in them better ways, additional ways to be economical, to conserve resources.

Value education

Value-based education is at the heart of Sevalaya, founded on the teachings of Mahakavi Bharathiyar, Mahatma Gandhi and Swami Vivekananda. From daily prayers, communal harmony practices to cultural activities and competitions, over 2 lakh + children imbibe morality and grow as responsible, value-driven citizens.

Standing on his own legs

R Chinna Raju is a farmer with a land holding of 35 cents in Arikkampettu Village in Tamil Nadu's Thiruvallur District. He grows jasmine flowers, a popular item of daily consumption for beauty and the deity.

A plant can last 30 years and requires daily watering and regular medicines. A full day's labour costs ₹200. He gets family members and relatives to pluck the flowers and pays them a lot more, more like huge dividends. He himself works full day.

Son of an agricultural labourer, Chinna Raju never went to school. He does not know the year he was born, but reckons he is over 70. He remembers that he was married to Nagammal in 1973. The couple have four children – two sons and two daughters, all settled in life.

Then in 2019 a thorn got lodged in the sole of his left leg. Soon it became a wound, a festering wound, disrupting the rhythm of a life built around daily work. Chinna Raju has always prided in being a healthy man in a healthy community. He believes Ragi (Finger millet) is their community secret. He is a teetotaler.. And alcohol – no way!

On visiting a hospital, he was diagnosed with diabetes. There started a new phase dominated by endless hospital visits! Auto charges, doctors fee and medicines did not come cheap. Six months of regular visits, and his wound was getting worse. That had Chinna Raju worried. So he changed the hospital. But nothing changed. Each month made him poorer by Rs 5,000. In all, four hospitals treated him but the wound didn't heal.

Then he heard about Sevalaya's medical centre and made a visit. It was 12 km away, but was linked by a good road he could cover on his scooter. There the nurses thoroughly cleaned his wound and dressed. He got injections and medicines. Everything free! Also regular counselling by Renuka Sister: "Keep the wound clean, wrap it in a plastic cover, avoid sweets, or be ready to lose the leg!" That worked! Another mistake Chinna Raju had been making was to stop medication when the money ran out. At Sevalaya Medical Centre, he was given a month's medicine, free, each time.

Chinna Raju has always prided in being a healthy man in a healthy community. He believes Ragi (Finger millet) is their community secret. He is a teetotaler.



The family is relieved that Chinna Raju has recovered, after all had almost lost hope. Today he is healthy again, back to his usual self.

Chinna Raju and his wife Nagammal are self-reliant and do not trouble their four children, including the youngest who is an engineer. Chinna Raju loves his land and working at his farm, standing on his own legs!

Healthcare

Since 1994, Sevalaya's healthcare initiatives span rural medical camps and clinics, tribal outreach, menstrual hygiene awareness and support and mental health services for vulnerable women. Beneficiaries exceed 7,00,080.

Clawing back, climbing up

Srirampura is a settlement barely 3 kms off the Bangalore Central Railway Station. It has narrow lanes and small multi-storied houses occupied mostly by labourers employed in the cloth market and clothing factories. Little Flower High School is a prominent and popular neighbourhood school run by Madhusadhan Babu, from a family of educationists. He has made a classroom available for Sevalaya to run a Tuition Centre, which benefits 30 children who do not have the home atmosphere or parental support. Komathi Madam, a teacher from the school, runs it from 5.00 pm to 7.00 pm. A grandmother, she has patience and affection for the kids, and is a friend of the parents.

The following stories of three children, struck by tragedies, illustrate the difference a little timely and thoughtful help can make, as they try to claw back.

Sanjeevan and Geshreya lost their father Arokiaraj, an auto driver, in 2025, in a matter of four months after detecting colon cancer. The kids did not know what was happening. With family members shuttling between home and hospital, the children consoled each other. At the same time, Sanjeevan developed chronic stomach pain and had to undergo appendix operation.

"When it happened, I was blinded. I didn't know what to do", recalls their mother Bhavya. Fortunately, Bhavya's mother became the sole support to the family with her income from housekeeping in a company. Bhavya underwent beautician training and hopes to bring life back on an even keel.

Having missed classes, Sanjeevan could not read Kannada and Hindi earlier. Now he can. He got an understanding of square roots, thanks to

the tuition class. Sanjeevan has got better with spelling and reading words. He has improved his English marks from 50% to 70%.

Petite and ever smiling, Geshreya confidently responds in correct English without hesitation. "I didn't know how to read poems. Now I know. I didn't know sums. Now I know addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division", says a beaming Geshreya. Her marks have vastly improved during the year. She won the 50 m race at the last sports day, she proudly informs.

The kids fondly remember their late father Arokiaraj and the rides to city spots including Cubbon Park and Lalbaug. Geshreya wants to fulfil her father's dream and become a doctor to treat cancer patients. Sanjeevan wants to become an engineer.

Hasini V, a single child of Vinod and Shanti, is pre-cautious, curious and intelligent, with a neat handwriting. She and Shanti have somewhat recovered from a double blow that Covid struck. In September, 2020, Covid claimed Vinod and within a week Shanti's brother Murugan. Recovering from the blow, Shanti collected her wits and her previous employer was happy to offer her job back. With that, she could support a larger family including her parents and her brother's wife and child.

Hasini has been a topper from Standard 3. She has a purpose in life encouraged by her mother. She had trouble with mathematics and used to cry, until she "learned everything and now maths is easy for me". Her maths marks have improved from 75% to over 95% and languages marks up from 70% to 80%. It is daily routine to show her tuition work to Shanti and take help in mathematics. Hasini's mission: Save lives by becoming a doctor in a village. I am glad that mother has promised me the support needed".



After-School Study Centres

50 After-School Study Centres in collaboration with IITM Pravartak, equipped with smart boards and a focus on STEM-based learning, support 2,520+ children in underserved communities, offering an enabling atmosphere not available at home, Result: improved retention, interest and academic performance.

“The best will happen!”

Born in Uthiramerur, Thilaga did her B.Com in 2008. Her father cultivated leased land. Her Mom was a home maker. She dreamt of a bank job since she was good in accounts. Within months, she was married off to V Manigandan, an engineering diploma holder in Kanchipuram, who was engaged in construction business. Manigandan built a first-floor house above his father's house. The couple had a happy life. In a year elder daughter Shalini was born. Three years later, Nethra. Manigandan would drive them to Vandallur zoo and theme parks. The good days gradually turned sour when Manigandan's business faced challenges, including bad debts. Manigandan turned to drinking. Relations with the in-laws, including Manigandan's brother and sister-in-law were turning sour over small matters. Manigandan's father refused to mortgage family property, to bid for business. Then in 2018, Manigandan met with a road accident in front of their house and died on the spot.

That was a hammer blow. Thilaga didn't know what to do. Hostile in-laws. No income. No bank balance. Thilaga struggled to continue the children's studies. She took up a packing job in a distant factory. In three months, transport was withdrawn and she had to give up the work. A few months with an NGO, and then she got a contract work with State Bank of India for Life Insurance policy marketing. Then came Covid-19 and she lost her job. Thilaga and the two children survived for a while on the kindness of a bank cashier.

“Why are you here? Our son is gone, please go away”, she was told by her in-laws. Thilaga could not withstand the aggression. She returned to Uthiramerur and took a house on rent, not far from her parents who lived with their son and his family. Some insurance refunds and her jewellery helped meet rent advance and children's bare expenses.

From a neighbour, she heard about free training in computers, at the Sevalaya Community College. Backed by her college degree, she could absorb the subject, though rusted. The company of classmates and the classes helped. When many young classmates shared their terrible life stories, Thilaga realised how better off she was, despite the loss of the dear one.

“Only the best will happen”, she keeps telling herself and her two girls, who are her friends more than her children, as they wade through their life together, in mutual support.



Such was the predicament of many young girls and women. She and her children have their own house, though not suitable for staying presently.

Some frustrating months and finally Thilaga got a job in an IT company serving international retailers. In a seven-year long struggle after the loss of Manigandan, 2025 marked some relief and return of confidence. Every time plagued by self-doubts, her faith was the redeemer. “The best will happen”, she keeps telling herself and her two girls, who are her friends more than her children, as they wade through their life together, in mutual support. And the belief that “The best will happen!”

Women's welfare

Sevalaya runs nine Community Colleges across six districts in Tamil Nadu, providing free, short-term skill training to 1,000+ youth annually, 70% women, enabling many to escape the dead ends in life. The programme has trained 5,400+ women with nearly 75% placed on jobs and many self-employed.

Tribal Welfare: From Survival To Transformation

Sevalaya reaches out to a tribal community in excess of 23,000 in 80 villages in Gudalur neighbouring regions. Healthcare includes hospital facilities, health screening & awareness programs through mobile medical vans and camps. The tribal welfare package has education, support for tribal culture and essentials like blankets, dresses, daily snacks, sports kits and gifts from volunteers based on tribal children's requests.

At 94 years, Kothi Kolamban is the oldest in her tribal community in the remote hamlet of Ezhumuram. She had suffered from chronic asthma for over a decade. When breathless, she cannot speak or eat food. The nearest medical centre is more than 10 kms away. Sevalaya's mobile medical team found her in 2022. She was 90, bedridden, and losing hope. The team started visiting her hut every month. They counselled her children and grandchildren, empowering them as primary caregivers. Kothi visits the Sevalaya Hospital every week and receives a warm welcome and steam inhalation. With Kothi's health now stable and monitored, her two daughters can go to work or collect coffee beans and firewood.

Improved health of the 90-year-old matriarch has increased community acceptance of modern medicine. More villagers are coming forward for screenings for BP, diabetes, and anaemia. Several neighbouring households have adopted smoke-free cooking stoves and

better home ventilation to create a healthier environment for elderly family members. Kothi's presence at community gatherings is a symbol of dignity in old age. The child in her is delighted when she points at the nearby Avaram (Senna) tree in full yellow bloom. They decorate their deity with flowers on festive days.

"Sevalaya didn't just give my mother her breath back; they gave our family our lives back. We no longer live in fear of the next attack," says Kothi Kolamban's daughter Kempri.

Exiting poverty through Education

Sevalaya runs 18 tuition centres for tribal children in Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, and Kerala. They aim to transform tribal communities by changing family attitudes. So far the families saw children as miniature labour. For them to be perceived as seekers of knowledge is new and challenging.

The tuition centre at Kottamedu government school is a good example. Between its service minded headmaster A Anbazhakan and the empathetic tuition miss Jishma, they are trying to persuade the children to attend class and the tuition and come good in life.

Their progress cannot be measured in marks gained. Life is not easy.



For 11-year old Hari Krishnan, the last one year has been testing.

Set to complete his 6th Standard, he is the primary caregiver for his mentally challenged elder brother Kirumaran. The school is 12 kilometres away from his house and the brothers depend on the government Jeep service. Three months back his mother was chased by an elephant and she suffered injuries and is yet to recover fully after being hospitalized. Their father is the only bread winner now, working in the tea and coffee estates.

Hari has missed classes and tuition sessions. There was none at home to persuade the brothers to go to school. Hari's routine has been further affected by elephant menace. However, with Sevalaya's tuition classes, Hari Krishnan has shown improvement in the final examination marks.

Paarvathi is set to enter 10th Standard this June. The school is a 2 km walk. Her parents are daily wage labourers in local tea and coffee estates. To supplement their meagre income, the family raises poultry and sells eggs. Paarvathi is often asked to stay back at home to assist with housework and livestock care.

An intelligent girl with a good handwriting, Paarvathi's attendance has improved after she joined the Sevalaya tuition sessions. Teachers visited her parents to persuade them to send her to school. She is now determined to become the topper of her 10th-standard board exams. Her year end examination marks have

improved. She dreams of becoming the first graduate in her family. She wants to become a government employee, and give her family the financial stability that daily wage labour cannot offer.

Paarvathi sells eggs to augment family income. She has a bank account and receives ₹ 1000 every month, under the State Government's *Pudhumai Penn* Scheme.

Even as they break the cycle of poverty, the family is overjoyed that they will shortly shift from their hut to a new concrete house, built by the Government. Paarvathi's higher education, which the family now supports, will complete the transformation.



TRIBAL WELFARE

Sevalaya serves a tribal community of 23,000 through its Hospital and outreach serving over 80 villages in remote, hilly areas not easy to access. It operates 18 tribal tuition centres in Tamilnadu, Karnataka and Kerala.

“No friends and no enemies”

A bath at the confluence of Bhavani, Kaveri and Amudha rivers, near Erode, at 6.30 in the morning. This was the daily routine of Gopal Lakshminarayana Chettiar for 45 years. He was a regular visitor to the Sangameswarar and Kesavaperumal temples in Bhavani. He never missed his pilgrimage to Sabarimala for 47 years, until his mid 70's, in 2024.

Born into a large family of five brothers and three sisters, Gopal left school after Standard IX in 1966. He worked for nearly fifty-five years, in power looms, and later in a bag manufacturing company. Duty defined his life.

In 1983, Gopal sold his own house to conduct his younger brother's wedding. He took responsibility for the marriages of his two younger sisters as well, and over the years helped organise nearly ten weddings within the extended family. While others built homes and savings, Gopal quietly spent his life for others.

Gopal moved into a modest rented line house, with his widowed elder sister, Shanmugasundari as a neighbour. He also married off his three daughters in Bhavani. But as the years passed, relationships faded or frayed. Income disparities divided. People moved on with their lives; Gopal remained where he had always been — silently carrying burdens.

His wife, Ponnammal, passed away in 2016, multiplying his loneliness.

As his eyesight deteriorated further, Gopal underwent eye surgery through the Government's Kalaingar Insurance Scheme. The results brought little improvement. Doctors suggested an eye transplant, but the cost was far beyond his means. By 2022, he lost his factory job.

In his mid-seventies, he took up work as a security guard. During this period, his beloved elder sister Shanmugasundari fell seriously ill. Because he was working away from home, he managed to visit her only twice in the hospital before she passed away. That regret still weighs heavily on him.

Soon afterward, he lost his security guard job too.

With no steady income and no family support, every day became a struggle. An auto driver helped him reach Sevalaya's Old Age Home in Dharmapuri.

After a lifetime of sacrifice, work, estrangement and loneliness, Gopal asks for very little now. He is glad he has that - a life in peace and dignity.



Today, Gopal says no one visits him anymore. He himself no longer expects it. Years of emotional distance have hardened into silence. His elder daughter's marriage created further divisions within the family, and they are no longer on speaking terms. Tragedy struck again when his younger daughter, widowed at a young age, passed away a few months ago. Her daughter, Kavitha — a bright student who recently completed Standard XII with high marks — now lives with relatives.

And yet, despite all that he has lost, Gopal continues to live with remarkable discipline and quiet dignity.

His days begin at 5:00 AM with a one-hour walk. After tea, bath and pooja, it is time for breakfast at 8:15 AM. He reads newspapers with effort and his spectacles but has little interest in television.

Among the seventeen residents at the home, Gopal keeps mostly to himself. He has “no friends and no enemies.” He participates in bhajans and spiritual gatherings and visits temples whenever possible. The residents see him as a man of discipline, courage and resilience.

After a lifetime of sacrifice, work, estrangement and loneliness, Gopal asks for very little now. He is glad he has that- a life in peace and dignity.



Old Age Home

Sevalaya makes the autumn of their lives peaceful and dignified for destitute senior citizens. The Homes at Kasuva, Thanjavur, Zamin Endathur and Dharmapuri take care of 136 elders. A donation of ₹ 3500 is all it takes to care for one of them for a month.

The sustainability test

S Jayachandran was born in Kolathur village in 1962, when it only had paddy fields and small houses. A retired bank employee, he has been a witness to the changes. As he notes, agriculture has receded. Many migrant families have moved in, including families of employees in the neighbouring corporate. For the past five years, Sevalaya, with the support of many corporates has been creating sustainable villages by providing holistic support in the areas of safe drinking water, healthcare and education, enabling a better quality of life. The programme has expanded gradually over the years, following a structured pattern based on community needs and successful implementation outcomes. With a project outlay of over ₹19.50 lacs during 2025-26, the benefits reached a total village population of approximately 7,000 people.

A total of 8 RO water plants reach safe potable water to nearly 4,800 people. Each has a capacity to produce 500 litres per hour. Crucially, this has eliminated their dependence on pond water or untreated groundwater for cooking and drinking. Bad taste of food and frequent health issues are now just memories from the past.

Kamatchi is a young mother of two, in Kolathur village. Her husband drives an auto. She stopped drawing water from the village pond because the water has been getting polluted. Luckily for her, opposite her house is the RO plant. Food prepared using RO water tastes much better. Access to clean drinking water has helped improve the overall health and wellbeing of families in the village, she avers.

The mathematics is simple. Each RO plant fills approximately 60 to 65 cans of 20 litres every day. A 20-litre can of drinking water costs around ₹ 35 in the market. That can cost a mere ₹ 6, when sourced from the community RO plant. The nominal amount collected helps sustain the operations of the plants. The community contributions support electricity and maintenance expenses. Shared ownership and long-term sustainability result.

The project also supported rural children through 8 tuition centres, benefitting 160 students who attended regularly after school hours. The centres provided academic support, a positive learning environment and educational materials that children love: pencil,

eraser, sharpener, scale, note books and pouch. Recreational items such as carrom boards and Chess board, ring ball and throw ball make the time together fun.

In an unusual move, under the project, “Supplementary teachers” are appointed in the neighbouring schools where deficiencies are detected.

Healthcare support formed another important component of the project. During the year, 16 general medical camps and 10 specialty medical camps were organised across the villages, benefitting 1,554 patients. The camps provided consultations, health screenings and medicines for common illnesses. Special attention was also given to children suffering from vitamin deficiencies and nutritional issues through timely diagnosis and medication support.

Success of a village development plan lies in the quantum of benefits and beneficiaries. They can be counted, only when the results are sustained. That takes ownership, by the very beneficiary community.



Village Development

Holistic rural development initiatives since 2013 have impacted 610 + villages through community toilets, pond restoration, RO drinking water and healthcare services. Model villages integrate these facilities with quality infrastructure, creating sustainable improvements in health, sanitation and overall quality of life, impacting over 1,50,000 lives.

This year, special emphasis was placed on strengthening the effective use of Sevalaya's internal ERP system through in-depth training programmes for new as well as existing employees, ensuring better adherence, improved coordination and streamlined processes across departments.

Sports

Sevalaya continues to pursue a comprehensive sports programme, systematically evaluating each student to identify talent and provide opportunities, exposure and encouragement. Promising students are selected and given structured training to hone their abilities and achieve excellence.

Under the guidance of Physical Education Director Sankarapandian A and his team, students undergo rigorous training during and after school hours, including specialised coaching camps. This sustained support enables them to perform to their maximum potential in competitions.

Students receive coaching in handball, basketball, volleyball, athletics and chess. During the year, both boys and girls actively participated in various zonal, district, state and national level meets, winning several medals and accolades (Please refer to the table alongside).

The impact of this initiative is significant - almost 10% of Sevalaya students pursuing higher education secure admission through the sports quota. Many alumni have also gone on to build careers as Physical Education teachers and directors in reputed institutions.

5S and Quality initiatives

Sevalaya continues to adopt the “5S” model to strengthen its work culture and achieve high standards of quality across all initiatives.

Regular training sessions are conducted for employees on 5S principles, along with periodic audits, monitoring and corrective actions.

During the year, special training sessions were organised for a fresh set of project auditors to further strengthen internal quality systems. The newly trained auditors carried out their responsibilities effectively, and the expanded pool of auditors helped make the audit process more efficient.

Quality Month was observed in November 2025, with organisation-wide competitions in photography, poster making, quiz and kaizen presentations. Employees across centres participated enthusiastically, and winners were felicitated by an eminent guest at the Quality Day Celebrations.

They contribute across a range of areas at Sevalaya centres and project sites, including education, administration, healthcare, homes, community college and organic farming. Donors

Sevalaya primarily relies on the generous contributions made by wellwishers. These donations, which serve as the lifeblood of the organisation, range from small one-time amounts from individuals to substantial



and regular support from foundations and corporations. Donors come from diverse backgrounds, from local individuals residing nearby to international supporters who have witnessed and recognised the impactful work carried out by Sevalaya consistently over the years.

Sevalaya upholds a policy of non-discrimination towards its donors. 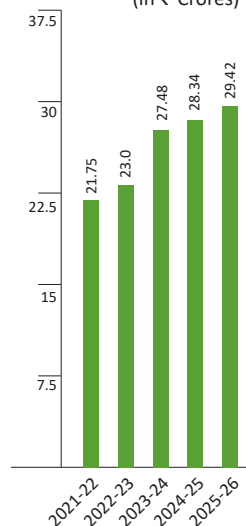
Sevalaya does not receive any Government grant, except for a portion of the Children's Home expenditure. Sevalaya has also been selected by the Tiruvallur District administration to operate the Reception Home - a temporary shelter for children rescued through Child Helpline, until their cases are heard and they are either reunited with their families or moved to Child Care Institutions. However, we do not receive any grant for this project. Government funding constitutes approximately 3% of our overall budget, while the remaining 97% is derived from donations.
